



Active Learning (in the age of COVID)

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Active Learning aims to:

“Produce learners who are **confident, responsible, reflective, innovative** and **engaged**: the Cambridge Learner and Teacher Attributes.” (Cambridge University Press)

Passive vs Active Learning

Passive learning is:	Active learning is:
Writing things down	Processing
Accepting ideas	Assessing/evaluating
Unwilling to discuss ideas	Collaborating
Recalling/remembering	Applying
Being right	Learning from mistakes

Engagement

We generally remember:

- 10 % of what we read
- 20 % of what we hear
- 50 % of what we see and hear
- 70 % of what we say or write
- 90 % of what we do

→ Every skills activity should involve *doing* (thinking and using the language)

Online Teaching Tip No.1:

Start the class with an interesting question involving choosing/ranking

Use the *poll* feature

Move to *Breakout Rooms* for discussion/justification of choices

Online Teaching Tip No.2:

Use the chat box for different types of activities:

- Interactive stories
- Dialogue practice (including disappearing dialogues)
- Error correction
- Instructions for activities
- Pronunciation (e.g. phonemic script)

Online Teaching Tip No.3: Encourage sharing of ideas in the breakout rooms:

- Give students a clear task
- Students can share *whiteboards* and documents inside their breakout rooms
- Whiteboards can be used for creative activities and graphic organisers

Online Teaching Tip No.4: Reading and writing can and should be active

- Use presentations/PPT – not only teachers but students
- Shared reading can be edited by students (e.g. for highlighting different parts of a text)
- Shared documents can be used for collaborative writing
- Multiple copies of a text can be copied into a document for different groups of students to work on in breakout rooms

Online Teaching Tip No.5: KWL is a great technique and works just as well online

- Elicit what students know already
- Elicit what they want/hope/expect to know
- Does the reading/listening/video confirm their guesses?
- What did they learn?
